Prof. Rachel Dyer

Rachel L. Dyer, PhD is an Assistant Professor of Psychology at Lawrence University. Dr. Dyer is a counseling psychologist—both an academic researcher and a practicing mental health clinician. She earned her BS (Neurobiology, Psychology), MS (Counseling), and PhD (Counseling Psychology) from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.



Prof. Allison Fleshman

Dr. Allison Fleshman, a physical chemist at Lawrence University, explores ion motion in ionic liquids for advanced battery applications and analyzes pigments in medieval manuscripts using Raman spectroscopy. She teaches Quantum Chemistry and Thermodynamics, sharing her passion for science. Outside academia, she co-owns McFleshman's Brewing Co. and enjoys yoga and cello.



Prof. Lori Hilt

Lori Hilt is the Milwaukee-Downer College and College Endowment Association Professor of Liberal Studies and Chair of Psychology. Hilt's research involves understanding and preventing the development of psychopathology. She has recently developed a mindfulness-based intervention, the CARE app, to reduce rumination in adolescents and tested it in multiple clinical trials.



Prof. Danielle Joyner

Dr. Danielle Joyner explores the intersections of medieval studies and art history, focusing on how medieval visual arts reflect cultural and environmental understandings. Author of *Painting the Hortus Deliciarum: Medieval Women, Wisdom, and Time* (2016), she teaches on topics spanning medieval to Islamic art, enriching students' insights into diverse artistic traditions.

Jill Manuel '84, a Lawrence University Philosophy graduate, is an award-winning news executive and creator of TikTok's @jillthenewslady. Founder of JCat Group, Jill's storytelling expertise has earned her Peabody and Murrow awards. A dedicated alumna, she received the 2024 Gertrude Breithaupt Jupp Outstanding Service Award and holds an MA from Syracuse University.



Prof. Megan Pickett

Megan Pickett is an associate professor and chair of the Physics Department at Lawrence University. She earned her BA in Physics from Cornell University and a PhD in Theoretical Astrophysics from Indiana University. After a National Research Council Fellowship at NASA's Ames Research Center, she taught at Valparaiso and Purdue Universities before joining Lawrence in 2006. Her research focuses on the origins of Solar Systems, black holes, and science pedagogy. A passionate advocate for preserving the night sky, she gave a TEDx talk in 2022 and is writing a biography of Manhattan Project scientist Elda Anderson the first woman to chair the physics department at Milwaukee Downer College.



Prof. Jerald Podair

Jerald Podair is Professor of History and Robert S. French Professor of American Studies Emeritus at Lawrence University, where he has taught since 1998. He introduced the university's first course on the JFK assassination and is the author or editor of seven books, including *The Routledge History of the Twentieth-Century United States.* A two-time winner of Lawrence's Award for Excellence in Scholarship, he received the Allan Nevins Prize from the Society of American Historians. He is currently writing *Promised Lands*, to be published by Princeton University Press.



Prof. Kathy Privatt

Kathy Privatt is a certified Alexander Movement Technique (AT) teacher, associate professor of theatre arts and the James G. and Ethel M. Barber Professor of Theatre and Drama. She received a Ph.D. from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, specializing in 20th-century American theatre. Privatt is in her 25th year at Lawrence, teaching acting, AT, theatre literature and history, and directing departmental productions. She also teaches AT workshops and currently serves as Communications Co-Chair for Alexander Technique International.



Prof. Claudena Skran

Claudena Skran is a Professor of Government and Chair of the Innovation & Entrepreneurship program. Her teaching emphasizes international politics, social entrepreneurship, and global issues. An expert on refugees, she has published extensively and founded KidsGive, a scholarship program in Sierra Leone. She also leads experiential learning trips worldwide.
